
## **Koa's Paw Prints**

## Practice Your Bond

An Instructional guide to working with your Canine

As explained in volume 1, the bond based approach is a way of using social connection to influence and educate your dog in a way that they choose to cooperate with us. So, that in mind, give your dog the knowledge and skills they will need to make good decisions by helping him/her do the following practice exercise:

In this exercise you could demonstrate a behavior for your dog to mirror, however, keep in mind that you do not want to make it *complex* when starting off with your dog. Make it simple and step by step so that your dog has the time to process the information that you are providing him with. If your dog is high energy, it is suggested that you get another person to help you with lightly holding your dog during the first stages of the teachings. Also, keep in mind that every dog has a different personality that influences the way that they use bodies when retrieving something or conducting various tasks. For example, some dogs will use their paw to retrieve a pill bottle from a cabinet, while other dogs are more comfortable using their mouths to pull the rope used to open the cabinet. In time, you will know your dog's strengths and be able to build on them as you go. Below is an exercise that we here at New Life K9's use with our dogs, and we hope that you too will find it easily applicable and enjoyable to the bond that you and your dog share.

- 1. Take a small bottle or container, stand it up on the floor in an erect position. Then, with your hand tip the bottle over gently while your dog is watching you. Be sure to keep your dog's attention by making this seemingly simple task fun & exciting.
- 2. Once you have knocked over the bottle with your dog watching, celebrate yourself by clapping and saying "Yeah me"! This will translate to your dog just how fulfilling it is to accomplish such a task.

- 3. After your self-celebration, stand the bottle back up and ask your dog, "Want to try?" With the dog's full attention on you, it is now time to allow him to try.
- 4. When you feel your dog is ready, ask him/her "Can you do like me?" while pointing at the bottle in front of him/her. Then, allow your dog to mirror what you have done what you did earlier with the bottle. (Again, your dog is either going to be most comfortable using their paw or nose to knock over the bottle, and both ways are a success).
- 5. After your dog has knocked over the bottle, it is just as important to celebrate his/her accomplishment, even if it is slightly touching but not knocking over the bottle. Remember, they are like children building their confidence and will need your encouragement all the way even through things as small as this.

We call this exercise here at NLK9's the "Do like Me", and once you get your dog started you will see just how easy and fun it is to do it with all sorts of things. Always keep in mind; it is all about the baby steps! ©

aking our debut with the Four Paws Bulletin, this is our very first interview coming to you from the echoing walls & grassy knolls of Pleasant Valley State Prison.

There are many deserving men and women whom we could have interviewed and whom have been an integral part of our program and its success. However, the success of others is many times made possible by the silent forces helping and guiding them through uncertainties from lack of experience and sharing wisdom gained through empirical knowledge.

We believe our first selection captures this spirit in motion, and this is *why* we have collectively chosen one of our very own Facility "D" Licensed Vocational Nurse, Mrs. M. Stringer.

Mrs. Stringer, as we have mentioned, we believe the care and attentiveness you have demonstrated with the dogs speaks volumes as to your knowledge of and love for these little critters. This is why we are also very excited about your willingness to allow us to interview you. So, without further ado, can you please share your thoughts on the following questions we have for you?

#### Q1) How did you come to know about NLK9?

A1) I read about the program through our Institutional/Interdepartmental website, but could not volunteer because I have too many dogs of my own at home.

Q2) What do you think about the New Life K-9 Service Dog Program on Facility "D" here at Pleasant Valley State Prison?

A2) I initially resisted the idea but once I saw the inmates change and interaction with staff I have been able to see it as a positive experience for everyone on the facility.

### Q3) How has the dogs being on the facility affected you and your co-workers?

A3) there are times when we are having a bad day; we just walk outside of our clinic, sit on the bench and watch the dogs playing. The sight of the dogs playing makes our day so much better.

Q4) The New Life K-9 Program stated as a two (2) year commitment and we are a little over a year into this commitment, with this in mind what can you say to the New Life K-9 Service Dog's Organizations Personnel in regards to the positive feelings they have brought to Facility "D"?

A4) I would say to continue with the program, as it has been a good program for the guys and the dogs in more ways than many understand.

## Q5) On a lighter note, all the canines are cute dogs but just one for the books, which dog is your favorite?

A5) (Mrs. Stringer looks right outside of her window to indicate Finn) Finn because of his personality, "sad look", but very spoiled. Another favorite is Parker because of his personality and attentive look.

#### Q6) Has your perspective towards prisoners changed? If so, how has it changed?

A6) my views have not really changed, but I see you guys now as being able to show compassion with yourselves and the dogs just the same. You seem to be very committed and in tune with each other.
